## ATMA INDUSTRY INVESTMENT AWARDS

### Jack Walsh Intermediate Milling Award

### Graeme Lukey Advanced Milling Award

|                         | <b>PURPOSE</b>  |

| <b>Aim</b>              | <p>ATMA will invest in the flour milling industry by offering two awards aimed towards increasing the technical skill level of flour milling students from Australia, New Zealand and the Pacific Islands. The following students are eligible for the awards:<br/>Students who are enrolled in nabim modules via ATMA Inc., <b>and</b>, who complete the module lessons and submit them to the assigned tutor for marking and feedback.</p> <p>The aim is to encourage students to put in 100% effort into their nabim studies thereby maximizing their potential. The judging criteria has been weighted towards rewarding effort. Therefore, those who put in maximum effort are likely to achieve highest scores for the purpose of this award.</p> <p>ATMA Inc. aim to:</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> <li>1. Achieve the best possible results for students studying nabim through ATMA Inc.</li> <li>2. Incentivise students to obtain their highest possible pass marks through maximum effort.</li> <li>3. Increase the overall technical skill level in the industry.</li> </ol> <p>Two awards are being offered:</p> <p><b>Jack Walsh Intermediate Milling Award</b> – Successful completion of Modules 1-4<br/> <b>Graeme Lukey Advanced Milling Award</b> – Successful completion of Modules 5-7</p>   |
| <b>Eligibility</b>      | <p>Both awards are open to all students registered for nabim modules through ATMA Inc., irrespective of age and employment status. Students must be completing the nabim lesson's for each module and submitting them for marking and feedback to the nabim tutors. The student will be considered eligible for the award in the year that they successfully complete the final module relating to that award. For students that have already completed some modules, we will allocate scores retrospectively based on lessons and results in previous years, i.e. if you finish module 4 next year, you will be allocated the appropriate number of points for modules 1-3 from the information we already have on file.</p> <p>There is no limit to the time taken to complete the modules. All modules <u>must be passed on the first attempt to remain eligible</u>. Should a student fail a module due to exceptional circumstances, they can submit a written request for special consideration within 30 days of receiving exam results to Executive Officer ATMA, P.O. Box 423, Buninyong, Vic, 3357.</p> <p>Students from Australia, New Zealand and the Pacific Islands who are enrolled in nabim modules via ATMA Inc. are eligible for the award.</p> <p>Students must have the approval of their employer to take part in these awards. ATMA will seek approval prior to announcing the winner. The employer of the Advanced Award must consent to the student undertaking the trip <u>and</u> making a presentation about their experience at an ATMA seminar following their return.</p> |
| <b>Judging criteria</b> | <p>Please note the judging criteria is largely weighted to reward effort. Having top marks <u>will assist</u> in achieving high scores, however maximum effort will contribute significantly to the overall point score.</p> <p>The following criteria will be considered by the tutors who will mark a student's efforts:</p>  |

Plagiarizing is easily picked up by the tutors and examiners so please answer in your own words.</p>   |
| <b>Prize</b>                      | <p><b><u>Intermediate Award</u></b><br/>Attendance to the Australasian Milling Conference (typically held on the Gold Coast) including return economy flights if required, 2 night accommodation and attendance to the conference, welcome dinner and conference dinner. Total value of the Intermediate award is approximately \$2000 (varies due to the location of the winner and flights required). Preferably the winning student attending the conference will be accompanied by a mentor or manager who can ensure maximum benefit from the conference.</p> <p><b><u>Advanced Award</u></b><br/>Five days of mill training with CARR'S GROUP in Scotland including economy flights, 8 night's accommodation, meal allowance, car hire and \$500 for expenses. Total monetary value of the Advanced award is approximately \$6000.</p>  |
| <b>Timing</b>                     | <p><b><u>Intermediate Award</u></b><br/>The winner will be announced at the Annual General Meeting in the alternate year to the Australasian Milling Conference (the AGM is typically held in October). Arrangements will then be made for the winner to attend the conference in May of the following year. Those who have successfully completed the nabim Intermediate Certificate in the previous 2 years are eligible. All modules must have been passed on their first attempt.</p> <p><b><u>Advanced Award</u></b><br/>The winner will be announced at the Annual General Meeting in the alternate year to the Australasian Milling Conference. Students who have successfully completed their nabim Advanced Certificate in the previous two years are eligible for the Advanced award. All modules must be completed on their first attempt. Students must have completed all modules (1-7).</p>   |
| <b>Judging panel</b>              | Nabim Tutors. Records kept and tallied by ATMA's nabim Co-ordinator or Executive Officer  |
| <b>Presentation to the winner</b> | A presentation will be made to the Intermediate Award winner at the Australasian Milling Conference Welcome Dinner held bi-ennially.<br>The presentation to the winner of the Advanced Award will be decided by the committee based on the winner's location.   |
| <b>Other Considerations</b>       | <p>Winners of the Advanced Award may be asked to present a report on their experience at an ATMA seminar within the following 12 months.</p> <p>Travel insurance, medical insurance, passports and any visas required are the responsibility of the winner.</p> <p>The committee's decision is final and no correspondence will be entered into.</p> <p>The winner shall be responsible for any damage caused by him or herself whilst undertaking their award. Failure to conduct themselves in a responsible manner shall render the award null and void.</p> <p>This document is subject to update without notice. The latest version will be kept on the ATMA website.</p> <p>Where two students receive the same score, the student with the highest marks in Section 1 will be deemed the winner. Where the scores are still the same the student with the highest marks in section two will be deemed the winner. The countback continues with section 3, then section 5, and then section 4 until a winner is determined.</p> <p>To be eligible to receive the award a minimum of 50% of assignments must be submitted.</p> <p>Both the GL and JW Awards are awarded every 2 years.</p> <p>Prizes are subject to substitution to an equivalent alternative where the published prize becomes unavailable.</p> |
